Weesaw Township

<u>History</u>

Weesaw Township was named after the war chief of the Potawatomi Indians - a very dignified man who enjoyed the great pomp and regalia associated with his important office. The Weesaw area contained large forests of black walnut, maple, beech, ash, and white oak. It was not surprising that Solomon and Hiram Gould chose the area to build a sawmill, calling it "North Mill". Having learned of their success, Nelson Willard, Joseph Ames, and Ezra Stoner soon built a second "South Mill." Competition increased, as did the population of Weesaw. By 1837 the area looked so promising that the Village of Troy was platted and the lots divided between the founding fathers. In that same year, Weesaw Township was officially incorporated.

For some unknown reason, the mill-owners became disenchanted and left the area in 1838. It took fourteen years of court battles before proper ownership was identified. In the meantime, settlers began to arrive in the Township and soon its population totaled 142. Inspired by the Baptist Reverend Daniel B. Mead, the Township's first church was built in 1854 at Hills Corner. The Village of Troy underwent an identity crisis in 1869, when the just-completed Chicago and West Michigan Railroad established a station three miles west of the Village and called it "Troy". As a result, the village officially changed its name to "New Troy". New Troy has never been officially incorporated.

Observations

Weesaw Township is neighbor to the tourist-oriented Chikaming Township community, yet does not seem to profit from Chikaming's industry. Although the number of second-home owners in Weesaw is growing, the community is still dominated by grain and fruit farmers. The Township is located amidst the rolling hills that are characteristic of Berrien County and is notable because of an abundance of small ponds and little lakes that are too shallow for recreational purposes, yet are ideal for land irrigation.

Weesaw Township is a typical farming community with a low population density and offers few municipal services. The crime rate is low. The Township is not as wealthy and as active as some of its neighboring communities, and does not contribute financially to events organized by surrounding municipalities. New Troy consists of 144 housing units and forms the downtown area of Weesaw Township. Major shopping and recreational opportunities are provided by nearby communities.

Weesaw Township is less interested in new residential development than it is in attracting new industries to help alleviate its tax burden and broaden the job base. The Township has all the qualities required by those who prefer the outdoors and quiet, rural communities
